THE AUGUSTAN CITY AND ITS MONUMENTS

Journal published by the AIA (Archaeological Institute of America). Articles on different topics, in English, and book reviews. The AJA style sheet ("Notes for Contributors and Abbreviations", AJA 90 (1986) 381-94), which includes all abbreviations in common use, is the standard one for publishing archaeological materials in English. Arch Bib *Archäologische Bibliographie.*

Bibliographic compendium, 1944-1993. Index headings in German but titles of articles and summaries in language of author. Since 1994 on disk (DYABOLA), available from page at front desk. FA ref. Rm., Table.

CAH *Cambridge Ancient History.*

Series of volumes dedicated to the history of the ancient Near Eastern and Mediterranean worlds. The first edition (1923-29, D57 C17) is out of date in terms of both scholarship and scholarly approach, but can still provide a reasonable narrative history based on the ancient literary sources. The text of the second edition (1982- , D57 C17) as well as the topics covered is completely different.

Ref. Encyclopedia with short articles on individual sites & topics. In Italian.

It was a source for Perseus.
